Standard of competence

- Every seafarer who is designated to perform security duties shall be required to demonstrate competence to undertake the tasks, duties and responsibilities listed in column 1 of table A-VI/6.
- 2 The level of knowledge of the subjects in column 2 of table A-VI/6 shall be sufficient to enable every candidate to perform on board designated security duties.
- 3 Every candidate for certification shall be required to provide evidence of having achieved the required standard of competence through:
 - demonstration of competence to undertake the tasks, duties and responsibilities listed in column 1 of table A-VI/6, in accordance with the methods for demonstrating competence and the criteria for evaluating competence tabulated in columns 3 and 4 of that table; and
 - .2 examination or continuous assessment as part of an approved training programme covering the material set out in column 2 of table A-VI/6.
